Points of Interest

• Old State Road 65 was reconstructed on a new alignment that begins approximately 300 feet to the west of the existing bridge and ties into State Road 65 approximately 200 feet north of the original location.

• The roadway consists of two-10' asphalt travel lanes with varying aggregate shoulders (2'-0" to 6'-4").

• The new bridge is approximately 215 feet long. It is a three span (64', 86', 64'), prestressed concrete I-beam bridge. The clear roadway width is 32'-0".
